A grant is a sum of money given for a purpose.

What is a Grant Ready Organization?

A Grant Ready Organization (**GRO**) is prepared to apply for grant opportunities. GROs have all of their records, registrations and audits in place, accessible, and upto-date. GROs have engaged and gained support from leadership, policy-makers and stakeholders. GROs align their mission, vision, and capacity with their understanding of community needs as the foundation of their grant seeking strategy.

Types of Grant Sources

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

The federal government administers several types of grants designed to accomplish different purposes such as research grants, demonstration grants, project grants, block grants, and formula grants. These grants are administered by each government agency.

STATE & LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Each state and local government administers several types of grants designed to accomplish different purposes such as demonstration grants, project grants, block grants, and formula grants. These grants are administered by each government agency within each state. These grants are often funds that originated from the federal government.

PUBLIC & PRIVATE FOUNDATIONS

A foundation is a non-governmental entity that is established as a nonprofit corporation or a charitable trust, with a principal purpose of making grants to unrelated organizations, institutions, or individuals for scientific, educational, cultural, religious, or other charitable purposes.






